BREMEN MIHEKE EXHIBITION

In June, members were invited to discover the Übersee Museum's back-of-house collection of miheke Moriori with an interactive webinar.

In 2017, the Übersee Museum in Bremen, Germany, agreed to repatriate a number of karāpuna Moriori. The karāpuna had been collected from the island in 1896 by Hugo Schauinsland, removing the remains from sand dunes and at locations near Lake Huro and Red Bluff.

Whilst Schauinsland was on the island, he stayed with the Beamish family in Te One, using their home as a place where locals brought stone tools and other items to him for sale. Today, the Übersee Museum cares for about 90 stone and bone Moriori tools.

At the time of the repatriation, HMT assured the Übersee Museum Director that repatriation would be just the start of the relationship. Since then, the museum has worked with HMT to share information on other miheke Moriori in the collection and draw up plans for a new exhibition that focuses on the colonial past of the museum.

The tour looked closely at miheke collected from both Rēkohu and Rangihaute and was hosted by a museum conservator, providing opportunities to ask questions and talk about specific miheke.

PUANGA MORIORI

Kōpinga Marae hosted a week of celebrations to welcome in the Moriori New Year in July. Over four days, various wānanga were held with a feast each day, which coincided nicely with the school holidays meaning we had a large turnout of tchimirik.

Our members further afield were invited to participate in the fun too, with recipes and other digital resources posted to our Facebook page throughout the week of festivities.





REPATRIATION FROM GERMAN INSTITUTES

In June, Hokotehi Moriori Trust trustees Christine Harvey and Chas Taurima joined a delegation from New Zealand to Germany to repatriate Māori and Moriori ancestral remains, which have been held in foreign institutions for over a century. The delegation was led by Te Herekiekie Haerehuka Herewini of the Museum of New Zealand Te Papa Tongarewa and supported by kaimahi Hinemoana Baker and Te Arikirangi Mamaku-Ironside. The group also included cultural experts Paraone Gloyne, Ngahuia Kopa, Hinerangi Edwards and Kiwa Hammond.

Private and public ceremonies were held in Leipzig, Mannheim, Stuttgart and Göttingen, where Moriori and Māori cultural practices acknowledged the unethical colonial actions of the past ahead of the kōimi's long journey back home.

The culmination of this work was a ceremony at Te Papa, where a pōwhiri was held to receive the kōimi upon their return. Members were invited to attend this special occasion. Chas and Christine have given us some words of reflection about their experience.





CHRISTINE HARVEY, TRUSTEE

It was a touching and emotional ceremony for all of us, with some reflecting on the strong connection it made them feel with their karapuna.

A highlight was Kiwa Hammond speaking at the formal ceremony on behalf of Moriori but also as part of the Te Papa repatriation team, as well as the seafood from Rēkohu brought over by Tom Lanauze, which the officials and other iwi in attendance greatly appreciated while taking the opportunity to learn different things about our culture and language.

STAFF UPDATES



ONE BILLION TREES

With a wet and warm summer and autumn, we've had tremendous plant growth in the nursery, so we had planters come in from the mainland in May to plant 23,500 trees at Kaingaroa Station. We took the opportunity while they were here to invite pupils from Kaingaroa School to spend a morning getting their hands' dirty planting and learning about the One Billion Trees initiative. The tchimirik had a blast and took some hakapiri away, which they planted on their school grounds. 145 bait stations have been put along the fence line to help control rat and possum numbers.

Nursery Lead Dani McQuarrie and I travelled to Scion in Rotorua to present to the HMT board, Scion and MPI as part of the required six-monthly governance meetings. While there, I took the chance to look at Scion's work on island species.

Seed collection and propagation have been ongoing ahead of Dani's maternity leave replacement starting.

ON THE FARM

It's been a busy time on the farm. Before the ship went away for 2-3 months for its 5-year survey, we shipped over 2400 lambs to put less stress on capital stock and ensure fewer mouths to feed over winter.

While the vet was on the island, we had the cows pregnancy tested and took the chance to do some BVD testing. We also weaned the calves and sent them to winter at Henga.

There has been a focus on fencing and gorse control throughout both farms. We've also welcomed Charlie Anderson to the farming team as Senior Shepherd. Charlie has come to us from Christchurch and is enjoying the variety in work.

KÕPINGA MARAE

The marae has been busy with several groups staying on the marae for different kaupapa.

Recently we had the Te Morehu Whenua Roopu come and stay with us, which was a significant highlight. Thirteen tchimirik of different ages and their hūnau from the North Island hapu were on Rēkohu for four days. During their stay, they travelled around the island with Deb Goomes and participated in the knowledge of pīngao harvesting. Pīngao is a significant weaving material for Moriori, and sharing this knowledge with others on the same kaupapa is very rewarding. We hope to continue this relationship-building.

There are also some staff updates to announce. Heidi Lanauze is covering my role of role of T'chieki Marae while I'm on maternity leave following the closure of Henga Lodge and the completion of our contract with Downer. Heidi brings fresh ideas and enthusiasm to the role, so I look forward to seeing the marae thrive from the sidelines while I take this time out to focus on motherhood for a second time.

The role has been a journey of challenge and growth for me, and I'd like to thank our imi for their support over the last couple of years.

BIODIVERSITY

The last few months have seen all the tree work for the year undertaken within the groves.

An essential part of the biodiversity role for the maintenance and ongoing health of the groves and rākau momori is removing all the competing species of trees and any smaller secondary growth, as these take valuable nutrients away from the established kopi trees.

Seabirds would have traditionally fertilised the groves, but due to the absence of bird life, this is also something that we now do by hand. This work has been completed across Taia, Rotorua, Kairae and Hapupu groves in the last few months.

With the completion of the tree work for the year, it's time to ramp things up for the up-and-coming trapping season. The traps have all been serviced in preparation for cat and possum trapping.

The last few months have been a busy time in my role as T'chieki Communications as I prepare to take maternity leave in August.



GOLDEN KAMOKAMO PICKLE

INGREDIENTS

1 large kamokamo cut into 1.5 cm chunks 1 onion, diced 500ml water 1/4 c salt 3T flour 1 tsp mustard powder 2 tsp curry powder 1 tsp tumeric 1 tsp ground ginger 1 pinch cayenne pepper 1/2 c honey 600ml malt vinegar

METHOD

Place the kamokamo and onion into a large ceramic or glass bowl. Dissolve the salt in the water and pour it over the vegetables. Cover and leave overnight.

Drain the vegetables well and transfer into a large saucepan. Add the vinegar, honey and spices and bring to a simmer. Cook uncovered for 10 minutes.

Stir the flour with some extra vinegar to make a smooth paste, then slowly add it into the pickle while stirring until the pickle is nicely thickened.

Pour into sterilised jars and leave for 2 weeks for the flavours to develop before enjoying on cold meat or with cheese.
